

Miles Keogh is the Executive Director of the National Association of Clean Air Agencies (NACAA). NACAA is the national, non-partisan, non-profit association of 157 state and local air pollution control agencies in the United States. NACAA provides technical resources, training, expertise, support and community to agencies advancing clean air and protecting public health from air pollution. NACAA committees address issues including climate change, criteria pollutants, air toxics, permitting, monitoring, and emissions reductions from stationary and mobile sources, among others. Miles leads the association's work with Capitol Hill, the media, and with industry and advocates, and oversees our legal team's activity in the courts. He also provides NACAA's policy expertise on enforcement, climate change, and environmental justice issues. In 2022 Miles played a role in the development and passage of the Inflation Reduction Act and its historic \$369 billion investment in federal funding for climate change action and a just energy transition. Before joining NACAA, Miles started and directed the Research Lab at the National Association of Regulatory Utility Commissioners (NARUC), where he advised State Utility Commissions on regulatory design and on energy, environmental, economic and security issues for over a decade. In that role he was instrumental in developing and deploying \$11.5 billion in Smart Grid Investment Grants under the 2009 Recovery Act. He also provided power system cybersecurity training to all 50 U.S. States, Canada, the United Kingdom, and to the power sector in Eastern Europe, the Baltics, and the Black Sea Region, including Ukraine - capacity building which was pivotal in Ukraine's successful defense of its power grid from cyberattack at the start of Russia's 2022 invasion of that country. Prior to joining NARUC in 2005, Miles worked in the wind power industry and sited energy infrastructure for the Massachusetts Public Utility Commission. Miles also spent five years as an ambulance driver and medic in Washington DC. He has a Bachelors in International Relations from Georgetown University, a Masters in Environmental Management from the University of Cape Town, South Africa, and a graduate certificate in Sustainable Finance & Investment from the Yale School of Management.
